Welcome Fr. John Sharp

You may have noticed that our church bulletin names Fr. John Sharp as our Associate Pastor part-time, and wondered why the "part-time" designation?

Fr. John Sharp was appointed a Vicar General in 2004 for a period of five years. The role of a Vicar General is to advise the Bishop and carry out many duties in the name of the Bishop. Since June of 2006, one of these duties is to chair the Diocesan Sexual Abuse Committee and be the main diocesan contact person in these matters.

Fr. John studied at St. Peter's Seminary and was ordained in 1971. He has served parishes in Windsor, Chatham, London, Stratford, Forest and Strathroy.

The move from parish life in 2006 into administration had a huge impact on his priestly life. The life of a priest is nourished by the people he serves. Thus, he was grateful to assist on weekends for six months at Holy Family parish before coming here to St. Michael's. Thanks to the proximity of St. Michael's to the chancery office, Fr. John is taking advantage of the opportunity to celebrate weekday masses here as often as his schedule allows.

There is a degree of isolation in the work Fr. John does in administration, so he greatly appreciates the Wednesday morning team meetings at St. Michael's. At these meetings with Fr. Murray, Mary and Dan he is able to do some faith sharing as they reflect upon the Gospel for the upcoming Sunday, contribute to the creative planning to



serve the pastoral needs of the parish and commit to the team in carrying out these pastoral services. The sharing of some meals with Fr. Murray gives them the opportunity to share and support each other in their priestly ministry. All of this feeds his personal and priestly life.

Fr. John acknowledges the warm welcome the parishioners, team and staff at St. Michael's have extended to him. His feeling of belonging continues to deepen and he is excited about the potential of becoming more involved, contributing to and sharing in the faith life of St. Michael's.

The Sound of Music

"When man comes into contact with God, mere speech is not enough. Areas of his existence are awakened that spontaneously turn into song." Pope Benedict XVI

It is, in the real sense, music to our ears. That beautiful sound of the choir leading us in the Psalm of the day and in the hymns which are a part of the structure of the Mass. The word "sing" occurs 309 times in the Old Testament and 36 times in the New Testament. Father Ed Hontiveros, a Jesuit priest known as "the father of Jesuit music," puts it this way - "Our liturgical hymns are prayers wrapped in music. They are, simply put, songs in search of souls."

You must have wondered from time to time, as I have, just who are these people who are willing to share their talent to assist us in the Mass week after week. the last nine years have, in her words, "blessed her life."

According to Sue our choirs are always in need of new members. No experience is needed - you do not have to be a budding opera diva or a Canadian Idol finalist to sing in our church. As a matter of fact there is no audition involved and therefore no initial joining stress. Sue suggests to newbies that they find a singing range that is most comfortable for them and as they grow in the group they will have the choice of singing soprano, alto, tenor or

bass, the major components of most sacred hymns.

As a choir member you will have an opportunity to learn how to read music. Copies of the songs are provided on CD and sheet music for you to take home. In

other words, learn and practice in your leisure time at your own pace. Each of the St. Michael's choirs has its own particular musical flavor, and the 5:00 p.m. repertoire is a mixture of traditional, folk and contemporary.

The rehearsals, held in the Music Room on Monday evenings from 7:15 to 8:45 p.m. September to June, are quick-paced and fun. Sue and the rest of the choir hope to see you there.

The Prayer Network

Pray for one another. The heartfelt prayer of a good person works very powerfully. James 5:16

Goal 1 of the Diocesan Pastoral Plan states: "As living signs of Christ's presence we will respond to the call to personal holiness given to all by committing ourselves to opportunities for ongoing conversion and spiritual renewal."

The Prayer Network offers you an opportunity for spiritual renewal while interceding for our brothers and sisters in need. St. Michael's has a vibrant ministry of prayer for special requests made by parishioners on behalf of a person in need, with that person's knowledge. Those for whom prayers are offered do not have to be parishioners, or even Catholic. We are called to be Christ's presence to everyone and so recognize each person as a creation of God and therefore our brother or sister.

Prayer requests vary greatly: some may be searching for a job, others are having surgery, and many are receiving treatments for illness, especially cancer. Some just ask us to remember a special intention.

A group of parishioners - young and older, singles, couples and families - pray in their own way, at their own time, in their own home, using their own form of prayer.

The Prayer Network Coordinator's name and phone number is listed in the bulletin. When she receives the initial request for prayers she contacts the team captains who in turn call their team members. The number of calls averages three per week. All requests are prayed for daily. Each person is remembered by name for three weeks. Their names are then put into a general category and prayed for continuously.

Many of the volunteers were first recipients, or family of, someone who was prayed for. This is the case of my own involvement. My daughter was five months pregnant when she called to tell me that she did not want to have anything to do with me and told me to stay out of her life. My life was threatened if I made any attempt to reach her. I did not hear from her for two years nor did I know were she was. My instincts told me there was a chance for a reunion. I contacted the police and was given a lead. My other daughter took a chance and sent a birthday card. Thankfully, we heard



back from her after six weeks. I saw my daughter again and met my 16-month-old granddaughter. It was the support of the Prayer Network that brought me to the point of following my gut feelings. After having had this prayer answered I joined the Prayer Network and later became the coordinator.

As a group we meet once a year to share faith and get to know one another. New members are always welcome. We have a small prayer book to assist you. Setting aside a regular time and making a special place with a candle and a sacred object can be helpful in creating a space conducive to prayer. Sacred objects include a bible, a crucifix, a statue, or a picture of a favourite saint. The discipline of regular prayer builds our own faith. Participating in the Prayer Network makes us more aware of being part of God's family and grateful for all the blessings that God has given.

We know that life includes pain and sorrow as well as peace and joy. I am reminded of a Beatles song, "Yesterday, all my troubles seemed so far away, now it looks as though they're here to stay, oh I believe in yesterday." Well, I believe in today because we are "a resurrection people." We have a God who became one of us, lived as a human, died, rose from the dead, ascended to heaven and sent His Spirit - a complete circle without beginning or end. Jesus invites us to join Him in that circle of life: suffering trials, enduring deaths of many kinds job loss, broken relationships - but also rejoicing in His resurrection that promises us new life. *If you have a Prayer Request or would like to become a Prayer Network volunteer, please call Dorothy Solomon at 519-659-8242*.

Bill Smith, dubbed "The Senator" by our former pastor Fr. Jim Mockler, shared some of his memories and gave me a glimpse into his life of balancing his insurance career, hobbies, family and faith.

It would be easy to speak only of his hobby and love of aviation. Seventy-four model airplanes are displayed on shelves, telling of a life of patience, attention to detail and perseverance, and the walls are covered with paintings of various aircraft. Bill is very sharp of mind with a great sense of humour as he speaks openly about his life. His limited mobility is greatly frustrating, so reliving memories is a great pastime.

Anyone who attended the 10:30 a.m. Mass will remember Bill as the white haired usher who drove the yellow 1970 Coronet convertible, always dressed very respectfully in a blazer and one of his 127 ties. His 65 years of service have earned him a permanent position on the ushers' schedule though he seldom attends Mass at St. Michael's anymore. Christmas and Easter are still a priority; otherwise he attends the chapel Mass at the Residence on the Mount where he resides.


He fondly recalls the friendships he has made over the years, especially his camaraderie with his fellow ushers and their bowling league. Bill regards service to the church as an honourable pursuit and sees a decline in respect for this vital role in the more casual appearance of those at Mass. He feels there should be a dress code for those serving in a ministry during Mass. Bill does not consider himself overly religious but he has enjoyed many a conversation with numerous pastors over the years. One anecdote he shared is that in the



early years there would be a little pile of dimes and nickels on the usher's desk to make change for the voluntary seating charge of ten cents.

The church has changed some practices over the years and Bill's faith has developed and changed as well. He speaks of God as a good friend with whom he chats throughout the day. His prayers are for his family, friends who have passed away, all who have lost loved ones and his community of St. Michael's. He speaks lovingly of his 53year marriage to Marjorie who resides at Marian Villa. He longs for their weekly visits but at the same time struggles with a tremendous heartache that they cannot be together. Their three children, Billy a teacher, Jimmy a real estate agent and Leslie a principal, are their most remarkable joys, followed closely by their grandchildren. The motto he lives by provides words of wisdom for us all - "Be considerate and respectful of your fellow human beings and love everybody. That way you will have made a decent contribution to life."

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Becoming A Catholic

The Right of Christian Initiation of Adults (R.C.I.A.)



Being part of the RCLA process was a terrific experience for me. It allowed me to slow down and contemplate the truly important aspects of my life. I am often asked the question "How do I become a Catholic?" It is a question I love to hear because it presents a wonderfully graced moment in my ministry where, through mutual sharing of values and beliefs, I am privileged to journey with someone eager to learn more about the Catholic faith.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) has its origins in the early Church and was reinstated by The Second Vatican Council as the way in which we welcome new members into the Church. It is a process of study, exploration and faith formation. Sessions are held on Wednesdays from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m., October to April. Those inquiring about the faith come

from a variety of backgrounds. Some have never been baptized, some have been baptized in another Christian tradition while others have been baptized Catholic as infants but have never received First Eucharist or Confirmation.

The first stage of the process is the Inquiry Phase. The candidates meet as a group to inquire about the faith. We cover a broad range of topics including God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, Scripture, Heaven and Hell, Prayer, Mary and the saints.

The candidates reflect on their faith and on the teachings they have heard. If they wish to proceed they are invited to come before the parish community to formally request membership into the Church. They are then matched with a sponsor who accompanies them to the weekly sessions and provides support and encouragement along the way. The sponsor represents the Christian community into which the candidates will be welcomed. The sponsor is normally a member of the parish but can be a family member or friend.



During the second stage of the process, the candidates reflect on the teachings of the Catholic Church. Topics include the Mass, sin and reconciliation, the problem of evil, conscience and moral decision-making, Baptism, Confirmation, and Marriage.

The third stage of the process coincides with the season of Lent. Lent is a time of spiritual renewal for the whole Church. For the candidates, it is a time to prepare for their reception into the Church at the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night.

Those to be baptized will celebrate the sacrament that night. Those who have already been baptized in other

> faith traditions make a Profession of Faith into the Catholic Church. All will receive Confirmation and Eucharist. The Easter Vigil is a time of great joy for the entire parish as we welcome these new members into our midst. This year 22 adults joined our faith community. We are blessed and renewed by the gift of their presence and witness among us.

> Welcoming new members is the responsibility of the entire

parish community. Through our support and prayers we create an environment in which they can feel truly welcome. In the weeks following their reception into the Church they are eager to discern their gifts and to find appropriate ways to share them with the parish community. We are called to encourage them in whatever way we can so that together we can build the Kingdom of God.

Next year the Easter Vigil will be celebrated on March 22 at 8:00p.m. Why not plan to attend and support the men and women who will respond to God's call this year to become members of our parish family next Easter.

The RCIA Process

A Journey of Faith and Friendship

Editor's Note: Jeff wrote this reflection during the RCLA

When Mary Taylor asked me to write something about what the RCIA process meant to me, at first I was honoured, then of course a little worried. I mean, how does one put something that has come to mean so much to me personally and spiritually into words?

Like many in the class, I married a Catholic, and promised the priest at the time of our marriage preparation course that I would raise our kids Catholic and they would attend a Catholic school. I didn't think much of it at the time. I just wanted to say the right thing so the priest would let me marry Kelly.

I grew up in a Christian home. My father is a United Church minister and I am grateful to my parents for introducing me as a child to church. I sang in the church choir, went to Sunday school, attended youth group. At university I was fortunate to be a paid singer in a church here in London. After that, I became the choir director at a United Church in Thamesford.

For the longest time I thought I was doing my job as a Christian. I went to church every Sunday, did my job and came home. Wasn't that what I was supposed to do? As I grew older I began to discover that something was missing in my spiritual life. I was simply going through the motions, not taking the time to think about my faith and where Christ fits into my life. I was making time for Him once a week, but didn't spend a great deal of time thinking about the Holy Spirit other than on Sundays. I needed something more.

My children were attending a Catholic school; my wife is a Vice-Principal in the Catholic system - the timing was perfect. In the beginning I joined the RCIA for them but was quick to realize that was not the case. I am doing this for myself.

Every Wednesday night, a wonderful group of people gets together with Fr. Murray, Mary, our sponsors and guest speakers to listen and share. Sometimes the





discussion becomes personal as people share their life experiences, and their faith journeys with each other. Other times, there is very little discussion, and I

suspect that many in the class, like myself, spend time on their own thinking about what was discussed.

I look forward to Wednesday nights each week, seeing the new friends that I have been fortunate enough to meet, but also allowing myself to be filled with a wonderful feeling of belonging. I am in the right place, and looking back at things, it is my journey of faith that has led me here. I have been amazed at how many people in our group have the same feelings as I do we have become "Companions on a Journey." Our journey is moving towards Easter when the culmination of our efforts will be rewarded, as we become members of the Catholic Church. Participating in the RCIA has made me realize that the journey does not end here, but should continue for the rest of our lives.

Late in 2006 St. Michael's Parish was blessed with the installation of a new marble Ambo designed to match the altar. In a dedication ceremony during the 8:30 a.m. Mass on December 24, 2006 Father Matthew blessed the new Ambo.

In response to Father Murray's request in a Sunday bulletin, Mary Catherine and Kevin Flynn decided to donate the Ambo as a tribute to Mary Catherine's parents, Rose and Joe Traher and her sister Anne Marie Traher. Mary Catherine says they "are more than thankful to be able to do this. My Mom, Dad and sister were given to me as my family and because of them my life and the lives of my own family have been more than abundantly blessed in so many ways."

The Traher family has called St. Michael's their parish home since its opening in 1911. Joe Traher was an active member of the parish until his death in 2001 at the age of 88. He and his siblings all attended St. Michael's Elementary School and for many years he was active in the usher's ministry. Until her death in 1998, Rose Traher was very involved in St. Michael's parish life through the CWL. She also was a strong and positive influence on the family's spiritual lives by ensuring their regular attendance at Mass, Missions and special devotions such as Forty Hours. In the Traher family there was no question about attendance at St. Michael's, "it was our life, our faith, our parish."



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Anne Marie Traher attended St. Michael's Elementary School and was an enthusiastic member of St. Michael's Parish until her death in 2005. 
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The Liturgy of the Word for Children

a learning experience for all

The Liturgy of the Word for Children is a wonderful opportunity for children in grades two to four to discuss the teachings of Jesus in a comfortable and interactive environment. Led by a variety of volunteers throughout the year at both the 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Masses, this experience is one that truly touches your heart and soul.

Debbie Lucas and I have had the joy and privilege of

leading The Liturgy of the Word for Children from April to June for the past three years at the 8:30 a.m. Mass. About ten children attend each week and we

are often touched by the incredible understanding and insight that children have with regard to their faith. We are also constantly reminded of what we can learn from children, if we just take the time to listen.

The readings covered in The Liturgy of the Word for Children are the same readings heard at the Mass but are written at the child's level. The children take turns lighting the candle and proclaiming the readings. Following the Gospel, we are able to talk in depth with the children about what the readings mean and how we can put the teachings of Jesus into practice in our daily lives. This is by

no means a one-way conversation. The children listen carefully to the readings and frequently ask thoughtful and probing questions. This is a wonderful time for discussion on how we can live the lives Jesus wants us to.

One of my favourite Liturgy sessions was the Sunday we were talking about forgiveness. The conversation focused on this experience is one that truly touches your heart and soul.

why it was important for us to forgive others if we have been hurt by someone's words or actions. After much discussion on this topic, one of the children shared the following, "It is important for us to forgive someone who hurts us. Otherwise, you carry all that hurt and anger around in your heart and it makes you not a very happy person."

> Before returning to join their parents for the remainder of the Mass, the children offer their own Prayers of the Faithful. The prayers often include

family members, teachers, friends, and sometimes pets who are ill, who have passed away, or who hold a special place in their hearts. These prayers are a wonderful way of learning what is going on in the lives of these children. The children are able to freely express their love, friendship and grief for those who are close to them through prayer.

A Student's Confirmation Experience

Grade eight means more than just the top of the school, better year-end trips and graduation. It is also the year that you are given the opportunity to be confirmed.

Confirmation is the sacrament we receive when we are ready to renew our baptismal promises. When we were younger our parents made the decision for us to become part of the Catholic Church. My family was fortunate to have two of the teens live with us while they were in London! The retreat was a great experience and easy to relate to because we learned from people our age. They taught about God through skits, games, real life stories and discussions. Before leaving they gave us each a bookmark with scriptures we could read to get to



know God a little better. Going into this retreat many people thought that it was going to be boring, but coming out their thoughts were totally different.

For Confirmation the Church wants us to have a sponsor to help us through our faith journey. This person should be special to you, encourage you in your faith and be faithful themselves. This person will always be there for you as you go through life's challenges.

On the night of Confirmation we gather in the church with our family, friends and sponsor to celebrate Mass. The bishop anoints us with Chrism (oil) on our foreheads just as we received in baptism. This anointing seals us with the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit- Understanding, Knowledge, Fear of the Lord, Piety, Wisdom, Counsel and Courage. To thank God we must use these gifts when they are needed.

My journey through Confirmation was full of learning and brought me closer to my faith. As your son or daughter prepares for this sacrament I encourage them to get involved in the retreats and other opportunities. I also assure you that your sons and daughters will have a great time as they prepare to become adults in the church!

Jolanda has been with St. Michael's for four years,





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


CROSS TSEARCH
